### **Public Participation:**

The Approval Authority will take public comment on an action item before the Approval Authority takes action on that item. Persons addressing the Approval Authority on an agenda item shall confine their remarks to the particular agenda item. For each agenda item, each member of the public may address the Approval Authority once, for up to three minutes. The Chair may limit the public comment on an agenda item to less than three minutes per speaker, based on the nature of the agenda item, the number of anticipated speakers for that item, and the number and anticipated duration of other agenda items.
- General Public Comment. The Approval Authority shall include general public comment as an agenda item at each meeting of the Approval Authority. During general public comment, each member of the public may address the Approval Authority on matters within the Approval Authority's jurisdiction. Issues discussed during general public comment must not appear elsewhere on the agenda for that meeting. Each member of the public may address the Approval Authority once during general public comment, for up to three minutes. The Chair may limit the total general public comment to 30 minutes and may limit the time allocated to each speaker depending on the number of speakers during general public comment and the number and anticipated duration of agenda items.
- Speaker Identification. Individuals making public comment may be requested, but not required, to identify themselves and whom they represent.
- Designated Public Comment Area. Members of the public wishing to address the Approval Authority must speak from the public comment area.
- Comment, Not Debate. During public comment, speakers shall address their remarks to the
  Approval Authority as a whole and not to individual Approval Authority representatives, the
  General Manager or Management Team members, or the audience. Approval Authority
  Representatives and other persons are not required to respond to questions from a speaker.
  Approval Authority Representatives shall not enter into debate or discussion with speakers during
  public comment, although Approval Authority Representatives may question speakers to obtain
  clarification. Approval Authority Representatives may ask the General Manager to investigate an

issue raised during public comment and later report to the Approval Authority. The lack of a response by the Approval Authority to public comment does not necessarily constitute agreement with or support of comments made during public comment.

Speaker Conduct. The Approval Authority will not tolerate disruptive conduct by individuals
making public comment. Speakers who use profanity or engage in yelling, screaming, or other
disruptive behavior will be directed to cease that conduct and may be asked to leave the meeting
room.

# REGULAR MEETING MINUTES DRAFT

# 1. Roll Call

UASI Chair Anne Kronenberg called the meeting to order at 10:02 AM and General Manager Craig Dziedzic subsequently took the roll. Vice-Chair Rich Lucia and Members Raymond Guzman, Cathey Eide, Ryan Broughton, and Al Terrell were present. Members Ken Kehmna, Mike Casten, Bob Doyle, Sherrie Collins, and Carlos Bolanos were absent, but their alternates, respectively Dana Reed, Elise Warren, Dave Augustus, Kevin Oakley, and Jeff Kearnan were present.

# 2. Approval of the Minutes

Chair Kronenberg asked for any comments or questions concerning the minutes from the July 9, 2015 meeting. Seeing none, she requested a motion to approve the minutes.

# 3. General Manager's Report

# (a) Management Team Update

General Manager Craig Dziedzic introduced the Management Team's new Grants Account, Lovely Lindsley. As the Grants Accountant, Ms. Lindsley reports to Tristan Levardo and is responsible for implementing all fiscal and accounting policies, including internal control procedures for financial and grants management for our UASI program.

Mr. Dziedzic also reported that Project Manager Dave Frazer has agreed to serve as the interim project manager for the Coalition of California UASIs (CCU). Mr. Frazer will focus on statewide UASI programs such as Cal COP, cyber security, and risk management.

# (b) Coalition of California UASIs Update

Mr. Dziedzic reported on a recent meeting between CCU members and Cal OES Chief Deputy Director Nancy Ward. At the meeting, Ms. Ward mentioned that Director Ghilarducci intends to implement a Homeland Security Advisory Committee to discuss and provide advice on the statewide strategy and priorities. The membership would be multi-discipline and include representation from the CCU. Additionally, during the last two weeks of August, Cal OES will be conducting six to eight workshops throughout the state to discuss the UASI 2015 grant guidance. Ms. Ward agreed to have quarterly meetings with CCU members to develop a better working relationship with the urban areas and expressed support for the statewide risk management program.

# (c) Advisory Working Group Update

Mr. Dziedzic reported on the July 23 Advisory Group meeting in which members met to review and discuss the 2015 Bay Area UASI Homeland Security Goals and Objectives, the FY16 Risk and Gap Report, and FY16 Priority Capability Objectives.

# (d) Management Team Tracking Tool

There were no additions to the tracking tool. Mr. Dziedzic reminded the Board that there will be no meeting in September. The next meeting will be on October 8, 2015.

# 4. FY16 Risk and Gap Analysis

Assistant General Manager Catherine Spaulding presented the FY16 Risk and Gap Analysis. This analysis shows where gaps are greatest and risk levels the highest by core capability in the Bay Area. Ms. Spaulding discussed the ranking methodology and highlighted the top five core capabilities in terms of risk and gap for the Bay Area Region. Changes from last year are driven by the expansion of our critical asset and key resources catalogue in Haystax as well as the evolving nature of the risks faced in the Bay Area. To

a lesser degree, changes in the risk and gap list are a result of the level of ability rating provided by Bay Area subject matter experts during the regional capability workshop.

# 5. FY13 Unspent Funds

Assistant General Manager Catherine Spaulding presented the Management Team's recommendations on the reallocation of \$800,000 in remaining funds from the FY13 UASI grant.

The Management Team recommends that \$400,000 of the \$800,000 be distributed to the hubs based on the 2015 risk allocation formula. Projects would be funded in order of priority (as identified by the hubs) provided that the projects can be successfully completed by December 31, 2015 and do not include positions.

The Management Team recommends that the remaining \$400,000 of the FY13 unspent funds be used to address core capabilities that rank highest in our risk and gap analysis as well as address regional priorities such as Super Bowl 50 preparation. The recommended projects and allocations are as follows: Cal COP/WebEOC Connection Pilot in the amount of \$50,000; Cyber and Public Information Officer Trainings in the amount of \$150,000; Planning and POD Equipment as recommended by the Regional Logistics Catastrophic Plan in the amount of \$200,000.

Members approved the following allocations:

- \$400,000 to be distributed to the hubs based on the 2015 risk allocation formula
- \$400,000 to be allocated to the projects as recommended by the Management Team

Members requested that additional information on Mutualink and POD planning be presented at the next meeting.

# 6. Homeland Security Goals and Objectives

Assistant General Manager Catherine Spaulding presented the Homeland Security Goals and Objectives, which is an update to the 2013 Bay Area Homeland Security Strategy. This document guides our strategies of prevention, protection, mitigation, response, and recovery from threats and acts of terrorism and other catastrophes. It aligns with the National Preparedness Goal and the California State Homeland Security Strategy and incorporates the capability outcomes identified in the 2015 Bay Area UASI Compendium of Core

Capabilities as well as those specified in the 2014 Bay Area UASI Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA).

# 7. FY16 UASI Proposal Guidance

Assistant General Manager Catherine Spaulding presented the FY16 Bay Area UASI Proposal Guidance. This document contains all requirements and procedures for the FY16 sub-recipient grant application, review, and approval process. The timeline and general approach of the process is consistent with prior years. The proposal submission period is during October, hub meetings are in January, and Approval Authority review and approval of projects is in April. Ms. Spaulding detailed the key changes proposed for the FY16 cycle which include the proposal form, kick off and hub meeting requirements, and the review process.

Members discussed the changes and Ms. Spaulding provided clarification regarding the project review process and roles of the workgroups.

# 8. <u>Urban Shield 2015 Update</u>

Commander Tom Wright and Captain Shawn Sexton of the Alameda County Sheriff's Office presented an overview of the 2015 Urban Shield exercise which takes place September 11-14, 2015. The event includes over 200 partner agencies and over 50 scenarios in the counties of Alameda, San Francisco, Contra Costa, San Mateo, Santa Clara, and Marin. There will be 31 tactical scenarios, 17 fire scenarios, 4 medical checkpoints, 4 EOC scenarios, and a regional attack. Yellow Command Exercise Director Corinne Bartshire presented details of the Yellow Command scenario.

# 9. Super Bowl 50 Regional Preparation Update

Project Manager Corinne Bartshire presented an update regarding the accomplishments to date and future activities included in the Super Bowl 50 Regional Preparation efforts. She outlined the scope of work and reminded the Board about upcoming workshops.

# 10. Emergency Agreements Analysis

Project Manager Corinne Bartshire presented a closeout briefing on the Bay Area UASI's Emergency Agreements Analysis. The goal of this analysis was to evaluate whether overlapping agreements exist for emergency response and recovery support across the Bay Area jurisdictions. Results of the analysis are presented in the Bay Area Emergency Agreements Analysis Summary Report. This report includes recommendations from the RCPT to continue evaluating and establishing emergency agreements necessary to build response and recovery capabilities in the Bay Area.

# 11. FY14 UASI Spending Report

Chief Financial Officer Tristan Levardo presented the FY14 UASI spending report. He discussed a table showing spending by jurisdictions and reported that 19% of the overall budget has been expended. Mr. Levardo also announced that the Management Team will begin the fiscal monitoring process next week.

# (a) Securing the Cities (STC) Grant Update

On September 9, 2015, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) announced that Houston and Chicago were the recipients of the FY 2015 and FY 2016 grant funding for the Securing the Cities program. The recipient for FY 2017 will not be announced until later in 2017.

In response to the announcement, the Management Team contacted Domestic Nuclear Detection Office (DNDO) and had an opportunity to discuss our submitted application with a DNDO staff person. The constructive comments from DNDO will be incorporated in our future application to the program.

In the meantime, we will be hosting the DNDO conference/training event scheduled December 7-10, 2015 to be held at the Alameda County Sheriff's Office.

# (b) The 2015 California Emergency Association (CESA) Annual Training & Conference

During the week of September 28, Janell Myhre, Corinne Bartshire, and the General Manager attended the 2015 California Emergency Services Association (CESA) Annual Training & Conference in South Lake Tahoe, CA. I participated on a panel with John Valencia, Executive Director of the City of San Diego, and Vinny Mata, Emergency Manager, City of Sunnyvale. The panel presentation was entitled "Creating Order in the Chaos of EOC Situational Awareness Tools".

Janell Myhre and Corinne Bartshire presented "Recovery Planning Tools and Templates", whereby they were the recipients of the 2015 Gold Award Winner for creating the Just-In-Time training videos.

# **Discussion:**

In the August 2015 meeting, the Approval Authority requested additional information concerning the Points of Distribution (POD) Planning and Security Project (i.e. POD locations, FEMA typing and security equipment needs)

What is a POD?

A POD is where the public goes to pick up emergency supplies following a disaster. The need for a POD is based on lack of infrastructure to support normal distribution of food, water, or other supplies. Local government is responsible for setting up and supporting POD operations, and local law enforcement is responsible for POD security. POD operations are a critical touchstone with the public, and the local emergency management agency's success is measured by meeting the public's needs in a safe and efficient manner.

# Background:

In 2014, the Regional Catastrophic Planning Team (RCPT) Work Group's engagement with the state-federal earthquake planning process revealed POD planning to be a critical gap in regional preparation for a significant incident. The October 2014 Regional POD Operations Workshop identified the need to identify and establish POD locations, consider pre-staging POD site equipment, as well as conduct exercises to build capability. In August this year, we learned that

the Supply Chain Security and Integrity Core Capability is ranked #1 in the 2015 Bay Area Risk and Gap Analysis, meaning, it is the most critical gap that we must close in order to address our regional risks. In September 2015, the Management Team held consultations with the core cities and reached out to interested OAs to discuss POD planning status and needs. We then formulated the project approach with their input.

# Projected Project Approach:

The UASI Management Team will work with a consultant and hold workshops with regional partners to identify POD locations, types, and security equipment needs. The consultant will also provide in-depth technical assistance to select pilot sites. Yellow Command 2016 will exercise POD activation with lessons learned from preceding tabletop exercises. Staff will explore the option of a regional contingency contract for logistics response services.

# **Discussion/Description:**

# Purpose

In the August 2015 Approval Authority meeting, the Management Team was asked to provide further information on the Mutualink system in the region to determine how it could be effectively utilized within the Bay Area. Mutualink is an Internet Protocol (IP)-based multimedia overlay network and is designed to leverage the sharing of your existing radio, video, telephone, and IP-sensory equipment including disparate systems, as well as next-generation communication technology. A status of the Mutualink system implementation in the Bay Area is below, as well as recommended next steps to ensure public safety and emergency management agencies use the system efficiently.

# **Background**

The Mutualink system history in the Bay Area was researched via personal interviews conducted with Bay Area county and city Emergency Managers, Mutualink vendors and the NCRIC staff. Written materials and vendor quotes were reviewed as provided by Bay Area stakeholders. There were no physical site visits or equipment tests.

The originally purchased Bay Area Mutualink equipment (legacy equipment) is stationary and considered an Inter-operability Work Station (IWS) complete with computers and monitors, accompanied with individual equipment components such as video, radio and telephone network interface controllers. The newer mobile Mutualink system consists of a virtual license called the

Edge platform which uses the Cloud through stationary and mobile technologies. The Edge enables the mobile sharing of radio, voice, data and text information.

# Status of the Bay Area Mutualink system

The initial \$675,348 investment roll out of the Mutualink system in 2010 was distributed to different counties and agencies in the Bay Area with little to no training, policies or standard operating procedures. Currently, some jurisdictions are using the originally purchased equipment and others are using updated Mutualink products. Some equipment was installed in Department Operations Centers, some in Emergency Operations Centers. Some Mutualink equipment has been installed, uninstalled and then re-installed. Some equipment has not yet been unpacked.

Twenty two Mutualink IWS and eleven instances of the Edge platform are available for use in the Bay Area. A list of current Mutualink equipment locations is provided in Appendix A. The Edge technology can be used without the IWS and Mutualink equipment can be redistributed and/or exchanged for other equipment types.

# Recommendations and Next Steps

After research and input from Bay Area stakeholders the Management Team recommends a phased approach to ensure the Mutualink equipment investment is used effectively.

# Phase One (Complete by March 30, 2016)

UASI Management Team will work with NCRIC to convene a Mutualink Focus Group with the following objectives:

- Assess Mutualink equipment and usage
  - -Conduct site visits and usage assessment
  - -Test and assess the Mutualink Edge applications
- Conduct a Mutualink Tabletop exercise
  - Establish objectives for Mutualink use in Super Bowl 50 in three counties
  - Utilize vendor provided training and standard operating procedures
  - Validate Mutualink product's effectiveness to support interoperable communication for public safety and emergency management agencies

# Phase Two (Complete by October 1, 2016)

- Determine additional Mutualink equipment needs and submit FY17 project proposals

# **Background and purpose:**

The Medical and Public Health Work Group has functioned as an UASI workgroup since 2012. It is a collection of leadership staff and individuals from Medical and Public Health local government agencies, medical facilities, and hospital organizations throughout the Bay Area.

The workgroup includes regional partners such as the Association of Bay Area Health Officials (ABAHO), the Bay Area Mass Prophylaxis Working Group (BAMPWG) and the California Region II Regional Disaster Medical Health Coordinator (RDMHC) which coordinates the Medical Health Operational Area Coordinators (MHOAC).

The work group provides the UASI Management Team with the related Bay Area subject matter expertise for input on risk management profiles and regional projects. Recently, FEMA Region IX reached out to selected members of the Medical and Public Health Workgroup for inclusion in developing their National Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Medical Countermeasures planning process.

# **Medical/Pubic Health UASI Initiatives:**

UASI has funded numerous Medical and Public Health Workgroup regional efforts over the past four years. Funded projects include support for the Mass Prophylaxis Full Scale Exercise, development of Multi-Agency Coordination and Incident Response Guides and developing website tools for BAMPWG and other public health professionals. These projects built capabilities

for the Bay Area in patient surge and patient movement planning, coordination of emergency medical response systems, hospital resources and rapid deployment of the Strategic National Stockpile of pharmaceuticals.

# Medical and Public Health Workgroup UASI Project Summary

Over the last two years, in accordance with California's Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS), planning partners within the Medical and Public Health Workgroup primarily addressed four of FEMA's Core Capabilities: Public Health and Medical Services; Mass Care Services; Public Information and Warning; and Operational Communications.

# FY 13 Full Scale Exercise Project

\$150,000

This project leveraged an annual statewide multidisciplinary public health disaster exercise and included coordinated responses to a real world Ebola threat and hypothetical Anthrax scenario for the purpose of testing information sharing, mass prophylaxis and medical surge capabilities. The project concluded in December 2014.

# FY 14 Incident Response Guide Project

\$150,000

This project involves the design, testing and distribution of four guidebooks with procedures for responding to large scale public health catastrophes including, foodborne illness, water supply contamination, infectious disease outbreak and earthquakes. The project is scheduled to conclude December 2015.

# FY 14 Multi-Agency Coordination Guides

\$150,000

This project produced operational area specific multi-agency coordination guides (MAC Guides) and strengthens regional public health and medical coordination through a web-based file sharing and planning portal.

# FY 15 Mass Prophylaxis Sustainment Project

\$75,000

This project improves regional ability to rapidly dispense medications in response to bioterrorism or major infectious disease outbreaks. In this project The Bay Area Mass Prophylaxis Working Group (BAMPWG) and the Association of Bay Area Health Officials (ABAHO) are collaborating to improve operational coordination and information sharing in catastrophes that will impact the Bay Area UASI counties.

### **Discussion:**

This item is an update on the Bay Area UASI's resource inventory project. In 2010, CalOES requested that the Bay Area UASI continue to support the development of a resource management software system called "Incident Reporter". This system was developed by G4 Global Tech, Inc. and was later named "California Metrics" as part of a statewide project. Over the years, state support waned and California Metrics was left undone. The Bay Area UASI eventually took ownership of the application and renamed it the "UASI Resource Inventory Application". This system is not actively in use today and has not been updated since 2012.

Starting in November, 2014, the UASI management team began a needs assessment for a regional resource management system. As part of this assessment, the management team conducted interviews with state, regional, and local subject matter experts. A survey was also sent to each of the jurisdictions in order to gain insight on existing systems and feedback on ideal systems. This presentation is a report on the results of this assessment.

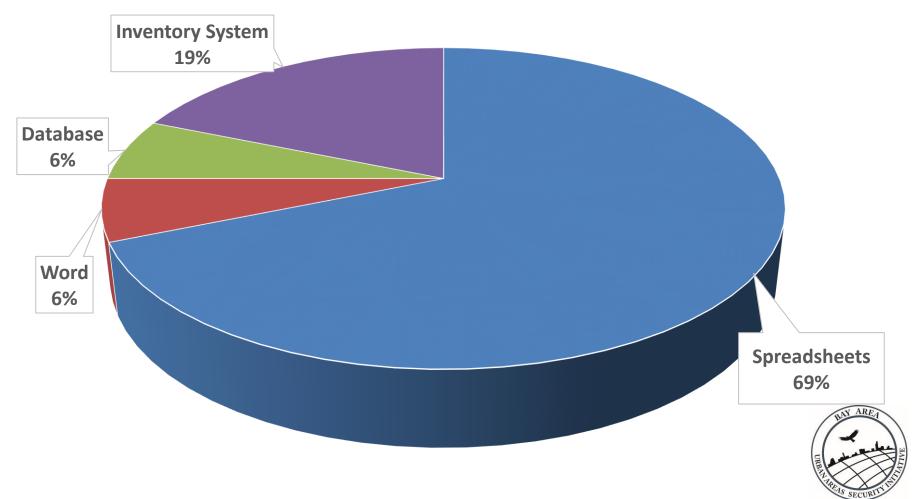

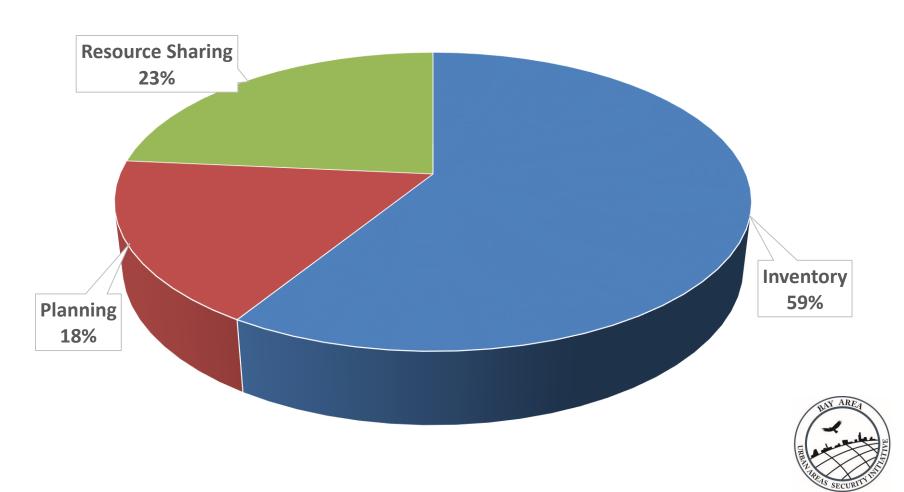

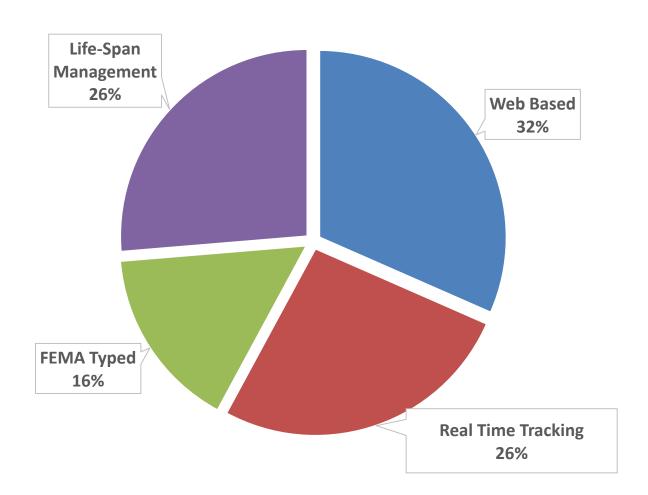
# Systems Currently in Use





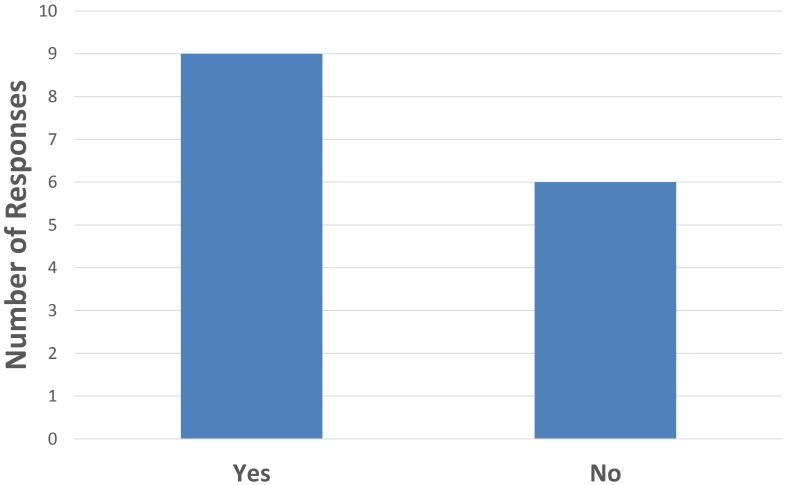


# What is your ideal system?



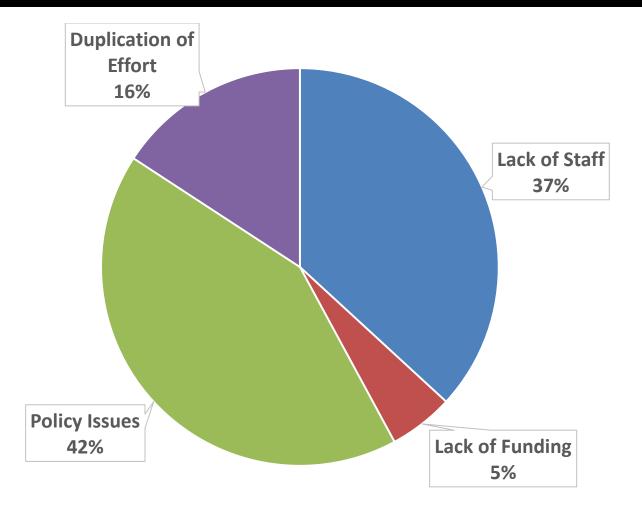








# Challenges to a Regional Asset Management System







- Bring back the G4 Global Tech system (aka Incident Reporter, CalMetrics, RIA, RIP)\*
- Explore the feasibility of integrating a resource management system into CalCOP or WebEOC \*
- Use the WebGrants system to manage resources

\*These options require funding, technical support, and regular inventory data updates by jurisdictions





# Use the Inventory module of the WebGrants system to track UASI funded equipment items

# **Advantages:**

- Zero cost to the jurisdictions
- Near zero staff support from the jurisdictions
- Pulls information from prior modules
- Includes UASI funded assets that can be viewed and shared amongst the Region
- Can be used as a basis for further expansion by each individual jurisdiction, if desired

# **Disadvantages:**

- No real time tracking, bar coding, or geo-code mapping
- Will only automatically populate UASI-funded equipment items

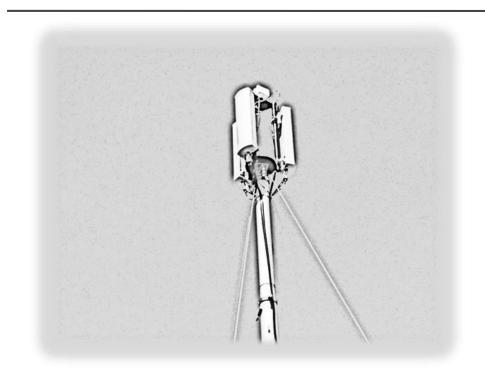

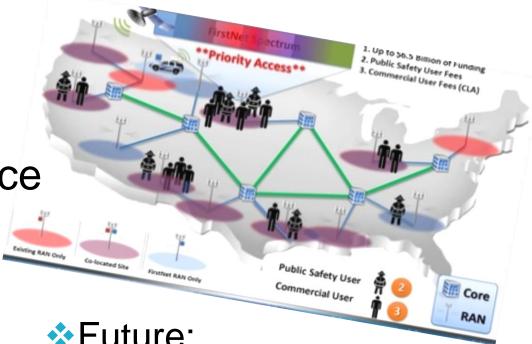
