Public Participation:

It is the policy of the Approval Authority to encourage and permit public participation and comment on matters within the Approval Authority's jurisdiction, as follows.

- *Public Comment on Agenda Items.* The Approval Authority will take public comment on each item on the agenda. The Approval Authority will take public comment on an action item before the Approval Authority takes action on that item. Persons addressing the Approval Authority on an agenda item shall confine their remarks to the particular agenda item. For each agenda item, each member of the public may address the Approval Authority once, for up to three minutes. The Chair may limit the public comment on an agenda item to less than three minutes per speaker, based on the nature of the agenda item, the number of anticipated speakers for that item, and the

number and anticipated duration of other agenda items.

- *General Public Comment.* The Approval Authority shall include general public *comment* as an agenda item at each meeting of the Approval Authority. During general public comment, each member of the public may address the Approval Authority on matters within the Approval Authority's jurisdiction. Issues discussed during general public comment must not appear elsewhere on the agenda for that meeting. Each member of the public may address the Approval Authority once during general public comment, for up to three minutes. The Chair may limit the total general public comment to 30 minutes and may limit the time allocated to each speaker depending on the number of speakers during general public comment and the number and anticipated duration of agenda items.
- *Speaker Identification.* Individuals making public comment may be requested, but not required, to identify themselves and whom they represent.
- *Designated Public Comment Area.* Members of the public wishing to address the Approval Authority must speak from the public comment area.
- *Comment, Not Debate.* During public comment, speakers shall address their remarks to the Approval Authority as a whole and not to individual Approval Authority representatives, the General Manager or Management Team members, or the audience. Approval Authority Representatives and other persons are not required to respond to questions from a speaker. Approval Authority Representatives shall not enter into debate or discussion with speakers during public comment, although Approval Authority Representatives may question speakers to obtain clarification. Approval Authority Representatives may ask the General Manager to investigate an issue raised during public comment and later report to the Approval Authority. The lack of a response by the Approval Authority to public comment does not necessarily constitute agreement with or support of comments made during public comment.
- *Speaker Conduct.* The Approval Authority will not tolerate disruptive conduct by individuals making public comment. Speakers who use profanity or engage in yelling, screaming, or other disruptive behavior will be directed to cease that conduct and may be asked to leave the meeting room.

NCRIC Deputy Director, Mike Sena, provided a report on the UASI Advisory Group meeting held on October 25, 2012. The Advisory Group reviewed the UASI sustainment projects and discussed the allocation of funding for the FY 2013 UASI Grant planning process.

After the review of sustainment projects and proposed regional projects, the Advisory Group decided to develop a definition to define sustainment projects. The Advisory Group will be working on that definition at their next meeting in November. The Advisory group will also be developing a proposed plan for allocations that includes sustainment projects and:

- Hub Allocation
- A set aside for the State Requirement (20%)
- A set aside for Management and Administration (5%)
- A set aside for the Management Team (\$2M)

The Board members and Mr. Sena, Mr. Filler, and Ms. Spaulding discussed whether Cyber Security should be added to the 2013 priority capabilities objectives. Member Godley indicated that the Board should consider having the Fusion Center create and develop a road map to begin addressing the steps towards Cyber Security risks and gaps. After much discussion, it was agreed upon that Ms. Spaulding would add Cyber Security to the 2013 priority capabilities objectives under goal 2.

Ms. Myhre indicated that the short term Logistics Project Manager selection is complete and a conditional offer has been made and contract negotiations are in process.

Ms. Myhre indicated that at the October 24th meeting, the RCPT agreed that a \$200K RCPGP Restoration of Lifelines project will be re-allocated to provide for consultant staff in the three (3) Major Cities to ensure their Logistics Appendix to the Regional Logistics Plan is robust and accurate.

11. Report from the Bay Regional Interoperable Communications System Joint Powers Authority (BayRICS JPA)

Barry Fraser, interim General Manager for the BayRICS JPA, reported on the status of the BayRICS JPA. Mr. Fraser indicated that the BayRICS Authority held its regular monthly Board of Directors meeting on November 1, 2012. Mr. Fraser stated that action items at the meeting included approval of BayLoop Maintenance and Monitoring Agreement, reports on T-Band spectrum givebacks mandated in H.R. 3630, the hiring of a permanent general manager, and selection of a new BayRICS Secretary. A new Secretary must be named because former BayRICS Secretary Deputy Dave Kozicki has transferred to a new position with the Alameda County Sheriff.

Discussion/Description:

- (a) UASI FY 2012 (Discussion Only)

The FY 2012 Accept and Expend legislation was approved by the San Francisco Board of Supervisors on November 20, 2012 and signed by Mayor Lee on November 29th. MOUs are being sent out from our office. Our goal is to have all MOUs distributed by the end of December. Each jurisdiction should obtain approvals by their Boards as soon as possible after receiving their MOUs. As a reminder, the FY 2012 UASI is a two year performance period, which closes on May 31, 2014. All purchases must be completed by the end of the sub-recipient performance period (i.e., November 30, 2013), and all reimbursement claims need to be submitted by January 3, 2014.

(b) UASI FY 2013 Project Proposal Update (Discussion Only)

As an update of the 2013 project proposal process, we have completed the four Bay Area Kick-off training meetings and accepted on-line project proposals during the period from November 12 – November 30.

During the first week of December, we sent Approval Authority members a list of their jurisdiction's project proposals to ensure that the proposals aligned with the goals/strategies of the Operational Area in his/her jurisdiction. Approval Authority members had one week to review them (December 3 - December 7). Any revision to a proposal needed to be communicated to Janell Myhre by COB on Friday December 7.

On Monday, December 10, the proposals will be sent to the UASI Workgroups for vetting. After the proposals are reviewed and vetted by the four UASI Workgroups (December 6 – 30), they will be submitted to the various Hubs for a selection process similar to last year. Janell Myhre, who is coordinating the process, has received the names of the Hub voting members from the Approval Authority members.

On the day of their Hub Proposal Selection meetings, all voting members will receive a binder with a spreadsheet summarizing their entire Hub's project proposal submissions and back up proposal documents with project details.

The Hub Proposal Selection meetings are scheduled as follows:

- South Bay Hub: Tues, 1/16/13, 10am-1pm, SCC Sheriff's Office, San Jose
- North Bay Hub: Wed, 1/23/13, 10am-1pm, Marin County OES, San Rafael
- East Bay Hub: Tues, 1/29/13, 10am-1pm, Alameda Sheriff's Office, Dublin
- West Bay Hub: Wed, 1/30/13, 10am-1pm, Dept. of Emergency Management, San Francisco

(c) Ratification of International Travel for Member Kronenberg. (Discussion; Possible Action)

In October 2012, Chair Kronenberg was asked by faculty members of Harvard's National Preparedness Leadership Initiative (NPLI) program to participate in their upcoming delegation to Israel for a workshop and informational exchange on population resilience. The trip is scheduled from January 5, 2013 through January 12, 2013. This is an honor for the Bay Area UASI since only a few NPLI alumni were invited to participate in the delegation.

According to the Bay Area UASI travel policy, approval is required from both the General Manager and Approval Authority for international travel and travel to non-continental destinations. In order to accommodate Harvard's invitation and meet CalEMA/FEMA international travel request requirements, the General Manager approved Chair Kronenberg's request in anticipation that this request would be on the agenda of the next Approval Authority

Meeting, Lessons learned from this trip in the area of community resilience planning/strategies will be beneficial for the entire Bay Area.

Staff recommends approval and ratification of the trip. The total cost for the trip is approximately \$8,546, which will be paid for with UASI FY 2010 grant funds. Both CalEMA and FEMA have also already approved the request.

(d) Approval of 2013 Calendar for Approval Authority meetings (Discussion, Possible Action)

Staff requests that the time and place of Approval Authority meetings for 2013 remain the same whereby they will occur on the second Thursday of each month at 10:00 AM at the Alameda County Sheriff's Office OES in Dublin, CA. Attached as Exhibit A, is the 2013 Calendar of Approval Authority Meetings.

(e) Management Team Staff Update (Discussion Only)

1. The Public Health Project Manager Position – Janell Myhre is the POC for the recruitment and selection process. Six candidates applied for the position and are from various areas in CA, including Fresno, Oakland, San Bruno, and Fairfield. Interviews will be conducted on December 11 with a final selection some time that week.
2. The Risk Management/Info Sharing Project Manager Position – Catherine Spaulding is the POC for the recruitment and selection process. Four candidates have applied for the position and are from various jurisdictions (Santa Clara, San Jose, and Sonoma County) as well as from the private sector. The interview and selection process should occur in January or February 2013. In the meantime, we are in the process of finalizing/approving MOUs for Capt. Kevin Jensen (incumbent) to be hired as the California Urban Areas Risk Management Program Manager, which should occur in January 2013.
3. The Regional Grants Manager Position – Catherine Spaulding is the POC for the recruitment and selection process. The position manages all aspects of compliance requirements of grants, contracts, and MOUs, and grants reporting to Local, State and Federal Governments. The SF Department of Human Resources has analyzed the job duties/functions and will be issuing a job announcement. Mary Landers is the incumbent.

Re: Item #4: Advisory Group Report

Recommendations:

The UASI Advisory Group recommends maintaining the FY 2012 Sustainment and Core City (San Jose, Oakland and San Francisco) Projects at the FY 2013 requested levels of funding, with one exception for the Resource Typing Database Project. Additional FY 2013 funding was requested for the Resource Typing Database Project for a contractor to support collection of resource data. The Advisory Group recommends using the Bay Hub Planner personnel to support the Resource Typing Database Project instead of allocating additional funding beyond the FY 2012 level of sustainment funding. The Advisory Group recommends that there should not be any new sustainment projects added in FY 2013.

The Advisory Group also recommends that regional projects that are larger than individual Hub projects should be submitted to the UASI Management Team for Advisory Group review.

Action or Discussion Items:

On November 29th, 2012, The UASI Advisory Group held a meeting to review the UASI sustainment projects and discuss the allocation of funding for the FY 2013 UASI Grant planning process. The Advisory Group developed recommendations to maintain funding for the BayLoop Project, the Regional Records Management Systems Information Sharing Data Projects (South Bay & West Bay Nodes of COPLINK and East Bay Node of ARIES), the Regional Training and Exercise Project, the Regional Fusion Center Project (NCRIC), the Regions Resource Typing Database Project and the Core City (San Jose, Oakland and San Francisco) Projects.

The Advisory Group also developed a recommendation that there should not be any new sustainment projects added in FY 2013.

The Advisory Group discussed the concept that sustainment projects must meet gaps identified by the Risk Analysis Center (RAC) and that sustainment funding should only be allocated to those core projects that are critical to reducing regional risk and have been maintained over previous grant years. The Advisory Group also discussed the need to annually review those critical core sustainment projects that maintain our Regions capacity to identify, mitigate prevent and respond to threats.

During the discussions there was a recommendation developed regarding the review of regional projects that were larger than individual Hub projects. The Advisory Group recommends that these regional projects should also be submitted to the UASI Management Team for Advisory Group review and submittal to the Approval Authority.

The Advisory Group will continue to develop a proposal for the allocation of funding for Hub and non-sustainment Regional projects at the upcoming advisory group meetings.

The Bay Area UASI Ad Hoc Legislative Committee will travel to Washington, DC, January 14 and 15 to meet with members of the Obama Administration and Congress. 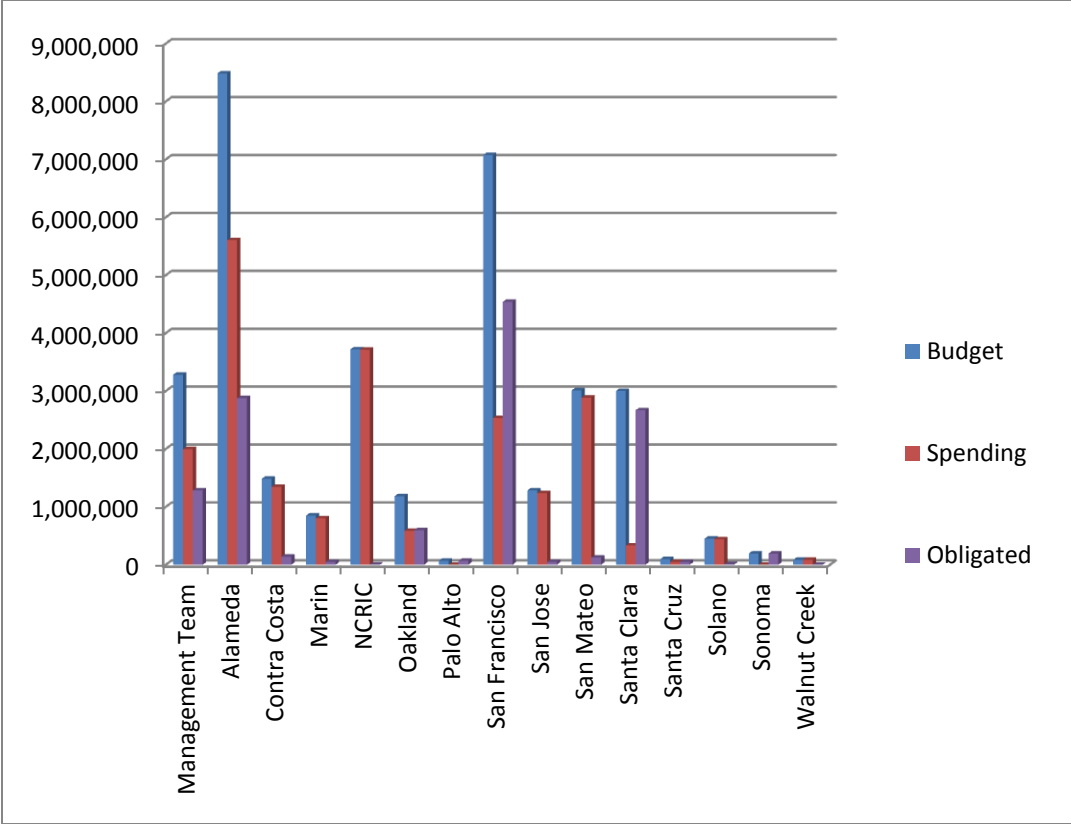
The revised sub-recipient performance period for the FY 2010 UASI grant is October 21, 2010 – January 31, 2013, with final claim for reimbursement due no later than February 28, 2013. As agreed in the Approval Authority meeting in July, only the performance period for personnel is being extended up to February 28, 2013. However, no funding reallocation or period extension will be allowed for grant dusts coming from non-personnel budget. From a spending level of 28% reported in July, our overall expenditures have now increased to 63% of the budget.

RISK OVERVIEW ASSESSMENT

- Law enforcement, fire and EMS personnel, representing agencies throughout the Bay Area UASI Region, participated in some, or all, of the 47 realistic scenarios. Their capabilities and equipment were evaluated by related experts, in order to provide an accurate regional assessment that result in a meaningful Gap Analysis, After Action Report (AAR) and Improvement Plan.
- Risk Management to develop and maintain the tracking of regional assets so that we verify their location, level of readiness and capability to improve regional preparedness.



INTEGRATED CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE

- The overarching goals of Urban Shield is to provide a multi-layered training exercise to enhance the skills and abilities of regional first responders, as well as those responsible for coordinating and managing large scale events. This exercise is designed to identify and stretch regional resources to their limits while expanding regional collaboration and building positive relationships. In addition, this exercise provides increased local business and critical infrastructure collaboration.
- Urban Shield 2012 operated under the principals of the National Incident Management System (NIMS), Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS) and the Incident Command System (ICS) structure. Regional emergency management personnel controlled the exercise utilizing the Emergency Operation Centers in San Francisco, San Mateo, and Alameda Counties, as well as the Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory functioning as the Area Commands. Alameda County OHSES served as the Department Operations Center (DOC).



TARGET CAPABILITIES

- The National Planning Scenarios and the establishment of the National Preparedness Priorities have steered the focus of homeland security toward a capabilities-based planning approach. This type of planning is generally conducted with some uncertainty, because it is extremely difficult to forecast future disasters with a high level of accuracy. Therefore, capabilities-based planning takes an all-hazards approach to planning and preparation and builds capabilities that can be applied to a wide variety of incidents.
- States and urban areas use capabilities-based planning to identify a baseline assessment of their homeland security efforts by comparing their current capabilities against the Target Capabilities List (TCL) and the critical tasks of the Universal Task List (UTL). This approach identifies gaps in current capabilities and focuses efforts on identifying and developing priority capabilities and tasks for our region. These priority capabilities are articulated in the Bay Area Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) Multi-Year Training and Exercise Plan, of which this exercise is a component.

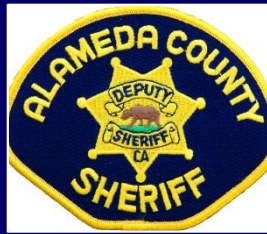

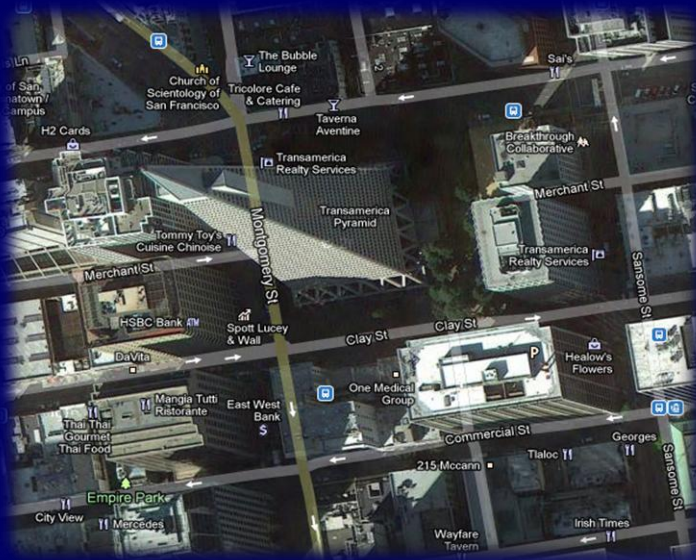

Discussion/Description:

Key tasks and deliverables are as follows:

Integration of the Regional Catastrophic Preparedness Grant Program into the Urban Shield Full Scale Exercise	\$57,000	December 2013	New area of proposed work. Developed with the Alameda Sheriff's Office.

Other tasks and deliverables include planning and advisory services and participation in the capability assessment and risk management program. Please note that the Management Team has assumed tasks previously performed by FSS, including writing the Annual Report, Investment Justifications (IJs), and the project proposal guidance for savings in the tens of thousands of dollars.

Total contract cost is approximately \$150,000 per year for two years, for a total of \$300,000. This is an approximate savings of about 20% compared to prior years. Please also note that due to savings from prior grant years, we anticipate requesting less than one half of the total contract cost (\$150,000) from the fiscal year 2013 UASI grant.

Background

Action or Discussion Items:

Report from the Interim General Manager of the BayRICS Authority on the activities and progress of the BayRICS Authority for the month of November 2012.

Discussion/Description:

BayRICS Authority activities in a number of key areas are described below.

1. Administration

The BayRICS Authority Board of Directors will hold its next meeting on January 10, 2013. Staff activities in November and December have included: (1) discussion of potential interest in BayRICS assuming a role in the review and recommendation of funding allocations for regional interoperable voice communications projects; (2) compiling information from member jurisdictions about subscriber mobile and portable P25 device procurement planning and interest in participating in regional pooled procurement efforts; (3) conducting a survey of members regarding T Band Spectrum usage and future needs, in preparation for the mandated T Band spectrum giveback established earlier this year in the Spectrum Act; and (4) outreach efforts to the FirstNet Board regarding the BayWEB project and BTOP grant partial funding suspension.

Financial Audit: An accounting firm hired by the BayRICS Authority is in the final stages of preparing an annual audit, as specified in Section 3.03 of the BayRICS Joint Powers Authority Agreement. Staff will provide copies of the audit to the Approval Authority when completed.

2. Sites and Backhaul Status

Jurisdictions are continuing to qualify sites through the zoning approval process, where required. However, site activities have slowed somewhat, due to a lack of clarity about FirstNet's programmatic goals and scaling back of Motorola efforts in order to preserve funding. Discussions with BART, CENIC and other fiber providers have slowed for similar reasons.

3. 700MHz Spectrum Waiver, Spectrum Act and FirstNet Update

FirstNet Board Update

BayRICS Authority Chair and staff will travel to Washington DC to attend the FirstNet Board meeting scheduled for Tuesday December 11. In addition, a sub-group of FirstNet Board members has set up a series of meetings with the seven BTOP public safety grantees to review their respective projects, including a meeting scheduled with Motorola on December 18. BayRICS Board Chair and Vice Chair and Technical Advisory Committee Chair and Vice Chair will represent BayRICS at this meeting.

FirstNet Public Safety Advisory Committee (PSAC)

The Middle Class Tax Relief and Job Creation Act of 2012 set out a requirement that the FirstNet Board establish a standing public safety advisory committee to assist it in carrying out its duties and responsibilities. FirstNet at its inaugural meeting in September adopted a resolution designating a subgroup of SAFECOM as its public safety advisory committee, and directed Chairman San Ginn to work with the Department of Homeland Security to establish the Committee and appoint the Chairman and Vice Chairs of the committee. On November 20, Chairman Ginn announced the appointment of four Vice Chairs of FirstNet's Public Safety Advisory Committee (PSAC):

Chief Bill McCammon, Alameda County, California, representing the Metropolitan Fire Chiefs Association;
Paul Patrick, Salt Lake City, Utah, representing the National Association of State EMS Officials;
Heather Hogsett, Washington, D.C., representing the National Governors Association;
Tom Sorley, Houston, Texas, representing the U.S. Conference of Mayors.

Chairman Ginn had previously announced the appointment of Chief Harlin McEwen as the Chairman of the PSAC. Chief McEwen represents law enforcement and, with the four Vice Chairs, will make up the PSAC Executive Committee. McEwen was previously the Executive Director of the Public Safety Spectrum Trust.

NTIA Notice of Inquiry (NOI)

BayRICS filed comments in response to the NTIA NOI on conceptual architecture model and applications development on November 6, 2012. Staff has also responded to FirstNet with responses to several questions about these comments. In addition, BayRICS staff and Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) Chair Ahsan Baig participated in comments filed for the 21 former waiver recipients, who have renamed their group as the Early Builders Advisory Committee (EBAC). Those comments were filed on November 8, 2012, and have also generated specific responses from the FirstNet Board.

Re: Item #12: Interoperable Voice Communications Projects

Recommendations:

That the Approval Authority consider revisions to the 2013 Grant Allocation process that would (1) allocate funding “off the top” for regional voice communications projects; and (2) request that the Bay Area Regional Interoperable Communications Systems Authority (BayRICS) review the proposed funding priorities for regional voice communications projects developed by the Approval Authority’s Interoperability Work Group and make a final recommendation to the Approval Authority for allocating regional interoperable voice communications funding.

Discussion/Description:

The UASI has Identified Regional Interoperable Communications as a Major Area for Capabilities Improvement, but the Focus and Funding for These Projects has Declined Significantly in Recent Years

According to the UASI’s 2012 Grant Effectiveness Report, interoperable communications efforts are a key area for capability improvement. In 2008, the Approval Authority developed a five-year strategic plan to achieve region-wide interoperable communications among emergency responders in the Bay Area. The Bay Area has created four sub-regional entities to deploy Project 25 (P25) voice communications upgrades within their sub-regions, which would, when complete, achieve the vision of a regional interoperable voice network.

However, in recent years the regional plan has stalled and interoperable communications funding has declined. According to an Approval Authority report presented in August 2011, UASI has awarded over \$43 M for interoperability since 2006, but funding for these regional projects has declined significantly in recent years. For UASI 2012, Interoperable Communications

allocations amounted to only \$2.255 million. Meanwhile, a funding gap of over \$125 million remains to complete the four regional projects and achieve full interoperability in the region.

One reason for this decline in funding can be attributed to the emphasis on allocation decisions based on the hub process, with less emphasis on regional vision and planning. The hub process works very well for allocating funding for projects required for a single agency or small group of agencies. However, interoperable communications projects, by their nature, require regional strategy, regional coordination and a regional funding plan in order to maximize their value to the entire region.

The BayRICS Authority Is Well-Positioned To Coordinate Regional Project Funding

The BayRICS Authority was created precisely to further this regional emphasis on interoperable communications. BayRICS's purpose, as stated in its Joint Powers Authority Agreement, is to "develop and establish . . . advanced information systems for interoperable public safety communications" (specifically including BayWEB and BayLoop) and to "cooperatively address the challenges of sustaining and managing shared interoperability assets and projects specific to voice and data communications." BayRICS is specifically charged with identifying funding mechanisms and system funding plans for these systems.

The Board is comprised of 13 Bay Area public safety leaders with vision and political savvy to drive regional coordination. BayRICS staff and Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) members have extensive technical and operational expertise in interoperable communications. Staff has experience developing system funding plans and could quickly develop a plan to assess gaps, allocate available resources and propose innovative funding solutions

BayRICS has already begun to take on regional voice communications initiatives, in recent months assuming a leadership role in regional projects such as BayLoop, FleetMap P25 channel mapping and regional concerns about T-Band Spectrum givebacks. At its November meeting, BayRICS Directors directed staff to begin research on a regional pooling plan for bulk purchases of P25 mobile and hand-held voice devices. BayRICS can also ensure an open, transparent decision-making process, as both the BayRICS Board and TAC comply with Brown Act open meetings rules.

Two of the four sub-regional P25 communications systems entities have expressed strong support for BayRICS as regional coordinator for voice communications planning. In addition, BayRICS staff has discussed this proposal with members of the UASI Management Team, who concurred with this approach.

The Approval Authority Should Consider Adopting a Regional Approach to Interoperable Communications Funding

Staff proposes that the Approval Authority consider revisions to the UASI 2013 grant allocation process to allow funding for regional interoperable voice communications to be taken “off the top” and allocated on a regional basis to further the regional needs of the Bay Area. In addition, the Approval Authority should consider taking advantage of the BayRICS Authority’s expertise and regional leadership, by requesting that BayRICS review and validate regional funding priorities developed by the UASI Interoperability Work Group and make a final recommendation to the Approval Authority for allocating regional interoperable voice communications funding.

For UASI 2013, BayRICS staff recommends that the role of the BayRICS Authority should be limited to reviewing the proposed funding priorities developed by the Interoperable Working Group, and providing a final recommendation for regional funding to the Approval Authority. This change would eliminate the need for hub review of these regional projects, and would preserve the regional approach to funding these projects. BayRICS would provide a formal recommendation to the Approval Authority for regional communications funding no later than February 14, 2013.

For future years, the Approval Authority should consider working with BayRICS to update and revise the Bay Area’s strategic plan for interoperable communications and develop a clear path forward for allocating funding for these critical projects. This revised strategic plan should focus on the most efficient use of limited UASI funding and development of other funding alternatives to fill in the gaps, to allow the Bay Area to optimize the region’s interoperable communications capabilities in the near future.
